

ONTARIO ENERGY BOARD NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OF E.L.K. ENERGY INC.

E.L.K. Energy Inc. has applied to raise its electricity distribution rates and other charges.

Learn more. Have your say.

E.L.K. Energy Inc. has applied to the Ontario Energy Board to raise its electricity distribution rates effective May 1, 2017. If the application is approved, a typical residential customer of E.L.K. Energy Inc. would see an increase of approximately \$3.50 per month. Other customers, including businesses, may also be affected.

E.L.K. Energy Inc. has also applied for approval to increase the specific service charge for service call – customer owned equipment and service call – after regular hours. It is important to review the application carefully to determine whether you may be affected by these changes.

THE ONTARIO ENERGY BOARD IS HOLDING A COMMUNITY MEETING

The Ontario Energy Board (OEB) is hosting a meeting on March 2, 2017 at the Essex Centre Sports Complex, 60 Fairview Ave. W., Essex, Ontario from 6:30 p.m. (doors open at 6 p.m.) so that you can:

- Learn more about E.L.K. Energy's costs and rate application.
- Find out how the OEB will review the application.
- Get involved and provide your comments about the application to the OEB.

THE ONTARIO ENERGY BOARD IS HOLDING A PUBLIC HEARING

The OEB will hold a public hearing to consider the application filed by E.L.K. Energy. During the hearing, we will question E.L.K. Energy on its case for a rate increase. We will also hear questions and arguments from individual customers and from groups that represent E.L.K. Energy's customers. At the end of this hearing, the OEB will decide what, if any, rate increase will be allowed.

Distributors such as E.L.K. Energy typically apply for a full review of their rates every five years. Any rate changes for the years in between are made by applying an OEB-approved formula which is tied to inflation and other factors intended to promote efficiency. You may not get notice of future rate changes made by applying the formula.

The OEB is an independent and impartial public agency. We make decisions that serve the public interest. Our goal is to promote a financially viable and efficient energy sector that provides you with reliable energy services at a reasonable cost.

BE INFORMED AND HAVE YOUR SAY

You have the right to information regarding this application and to be involved in the process.

- You can review E.L.K. Energy's application on the OEB's website now.
- You can attend the OEB's community meeting (date, time and place set out above) where you can ask questions, make comments and voice your concerns.
- You can file a letter with your comments, which will be considered during the hearing.
- You can become an active participant (called an intervenor). Apply by **March 6, 2017** or the hearing will go ahead without you and you will not receive any further notice of the proceeding.
- At the end of the process, you can review the OEB's decision and its reasons on our website.

These proposed charges relate to E.L.K. Energy's distribution services. They make up part of the Delivery line - one of the five line items on your bill. ORAL VS. WRITTEN HEARINGS

There are two types of OEB hearings – oral and written. E.L.K. Energy has applied for a written hearing. The OEB is considering this request. If you think an oral hearing is needed, you can write to the OEB to explain why by **March 6, 2017**.

PRIVACY

If you write a letter of comment, your name and the content of your letter will be put on the public record and the OEB website. However, your personal telephone number, home address and email address will be removed. If you are a business, all your information will remain public. If you apply to become an intervenor, all information will be public.

This rate hearing will be held under section 78 of the Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998, S.O. 1998 c.15 (Schedule B).
