Dear Ontario Energy Board (OEB):

In the Toronto July 27, 2013 Star newspaper there was a "Notice of Revised Application" with regards to the Enbridge Gas Distribution Inc. requesting to revise its application approval to build two segments of pipeline in the Greater Toronto Area.

If this pipeline goes through could you make sure that they make it so that it doesn't leak.

My concern is for any watershed that runs down towards Lake Ontario that if there is a leak it may affect the drinking water for all those who use the watershed's water supply. This includes the City of Toronto where I live.

I know that many oil and gas companies want to use pipelines for the distribution of their energy resources but they have to make sure they are unbreakable, that they can stand up to the winter freezing, any accidental drilling by another source in the area of the pipeline, an earthquake as we have felt tremors in the area before and any sabotage that may be attempted.

With the recent train derailment in Quebec and the recent tanker truck accident that was on the news some people are thinking that pipelines may be the best way to distribute oil and gas.
