Canadian firms must adapt to free-trade realities: report

A complex web of overlapping free-trade agreements is creating opportunity, but also new challenges, for Canadian food and agricultural producers.

Canadians will face lingering trade barriers, new competitive challenges at home and a changed regulatory environment as a result of trade deals with Europe, South Korea and various Pacific Rim countries, according to a new report by the Canadian Agricultural Policy Institute.

"We have entered into a world of competitive trade liberalization," says author John Weekes, Ad Muszell and David McInnis "In this new environment, countries are competing with one another to be the first to secure free or at least preferential access to the world's major markets.

Significant trade deals is just the first step. Now companies must put in the hard work to exploit these new markets," the report says.

The report urges producers to conduct a thorough "trade barrier audit" to determine the most cost-effective way to reach foreign customers due to the "increasingly complex and shifting regulatory environment of trade barriers."

Companies need to determine where best to locate production to take full advantage of the changed trade landscape, pointed

out Mr. Weekes, a former top Canadian trade negotiator and now senior adviser at Ivey from Bennett Jones in Ottawa.

"We've got work to do," he said. "It might not be as simple as first thought."

In the case of South Korea, Canada, the United States and the Free Trade Area of the Americas, Canada's trade negotiators have been working with the fast-growing Asian economy. But Canada is a relative late-comer, and U.S. and European trade will enjoy years of preferential access because they did their deals first. Meanwhile, Canada's trade negotiators have been working to get their feet set on the ground with preferential access before the U.S. as a result of the recently negotiated free-trade agreements with the European Union and Japan.

Because the European deal will take roughly two years to complete, companies have plenty of time to plan strategies and align their operations to take advantage of the opportunities, Mr. Weekes said. Industries must also ensure

they have the right policies in place in Canada as well as the capacity to meet any new demand, argued Mr. Muszell, a senior details associate at the George Meirns Centre in Guelph, Ont.

"We need to be prepared to have a discussion about how we are going to make this work, both in terms of regulatory changes and investments," he said.

The report cites the example of Canada's beef industry, which is poised to get 50,000 tonnes of duty-free access to the European beef market, up from almost nothing now. But the beef must be free of certain growth hormones that are often used in Canada. The industry already raising from eight suppliers will have to greatly expand its footprint to meet the demand, as for more beef than it wants to fill the quota.

The report also points out that significant new processing facilities will be needed in Canada to take advantage of new market opportunities in Europe and South Korea.

Mr. Muszell said Canada has made significant concessions to Europe to secure accession opportunities, including extending patent protection for pharmaceuticals and allowing cost-free dairy products into the country.

"Let's make good on it, and that implies new investments and some expansion in output to take advantage of it," he said.

Hydro One Inc., the owner of Hydro One Networks Inc. has applied to the Ontario Energy Board for approval to purchase all of the shares of Haldimand County Utilities Inc. Haldimand County Utilities Inc. owns the electricity distributor, Haldimand County Hydro Inc. As part of this purchase Haldimand County Hydro Inc. is asking for the Board to approve:

- (a) a one percent reduction in Haldimand County Hydro Inc.'s 2014 electricity distribution rates until rates are harmonized in 2020;
- (b) the transfer of Haldimand County Hydro Inc.'s distribution system to Hydro One Networks Inc., and
- (c) the transfer of Haldimand County Hydro Inc.'s distribution licence and rate order to Hydro One Networks Inc.

The purchase price of the shares is \$75 million, which includes a cash payment of \$65.2 million and the assumption of Haldimand County Utilities Inc.'s \$9.8 million debt. The applicants say that the costs of the purchase will not be funded by ratepayers and that the rates for the customers of Hydro One Networks Inc. and Haldimand County Hydro Inc. will remain separate until 2020.

EDMONTON If you build it, will they come?

It takes a lot of imagination to picture roughly four million people hanging out in Edmonton's downtown each year, all sitting in the name of entertainment. The dream exists, but the buildings do not.

Negotiations are in their final stages. Bidders are digging. And David Sater's real estate ambitions are at six-figure levels. When the billionaire talks about his plan to revitalize Edmonton, he has lists of numbers. Lots of numbers. He rattles off the amount of money that will be poured into Alberta's energy sector – the oil sands, refineries, pipelines – in order to sock up numbers off a second list. That list is the one that requires creative thinking and a lot of new buildings.

Mr. Sater's ambitious Edmonton new arena, dubbed Rogers Place, will be built with a million visits annually, with people going there for live music, rock concerts and other events. Rogers Place is the anchor of his Edmonton vision, District 17A, but not traffic to the district will extend beyond its doors.

The developers, led by Katz Group, expect annual visits to the arena to hit 2.5 million. The same goes for the planned casino. Both are included in the first phase of the project. This phase, Mr. Sater hopes, will be a huge draw for tourists and locals alike. If you really like it there, you can buy one of the proposed 1,200 residential units. Boosters for the CAD point out that Toronto's Maple Leaf Square only has 875 units.

Rogers Place is under construction, with people working on the second-level concourse. That's the surface that takes shape. You can almost see the Oilers shutting out the Calgary Flames when the arena opens in 2016. Other workers will be finishing in the plaza in just a few years. Back on the 3500-million Stampede Inc. tower is under way, with room to host 3,000 workers when the doors open. The City of Edmonton's 2.5-million building will host 2,500.

The CAD is being built on ugly parking lots and on the space where a Stanley Cup has shown office workers will be finishing in the plaza in just a few years. The first phase of development calls for 3,000 underground parking spaces for the public, and an additional 200 underground reserved spots at Rogers Place. Put it all together and, three years will cost \$2.5-billion and cover about seven of the district's 16 hectares. Build it and they will come?

Drinking driver

A 21-year-old Hamilton man is facing criminal charges after Haldimand County OPP officers said they caught him driving with more than 80 mgs of blood alcohol content.


