## Bala falls protester strong in resolution to stay

"Welcome to Turtle Island."

This welcoming sign was spread across the concrete slab of a controversial piece of property, a portage that has been targeted as the possible site for the proposed Bala Falls hydro-electrical plant.

The sign was partially the work of Peggy Peterson, who as of Monday, had been living at the site in protest of the proposed plant for 15 days. She said she is there to protect the property from development of the plant project.

When asked who gave the name Turtle Island, Peterson said she did but also replied "the island itself."

"The island wanted a name and asked for a name, and it created the name itself. There is a consciousness here on the island," she said.

To further support the idea for the name, Peterson said there was a sign provided to her that showed that the name should be Turtle Island.

"We had a Blandings turtle walk through here. This is actually a migratory pattern, and it is a threatened turtle."

Peterson, who states that the protest is of her own volition, said she has been in contact about the situation with representatives of the Williams Treaties First Nations, who state it has an outstanding claim against Canada and Ontario concerning the signing of the treaties.

The group consists of the Georgina Island First Nation, the Beausoleil First Nation, the Rama First Nation, the Mississaugas of Alderville First Nation, the Curve Lake First Nation, the Hiawatha First Nation and the Scugog Island First Nation.

## More than 80 per cent of survey respondents opposed to Bala Falls plant

A majority of Muskoka Lakes residents still oppose the Bala Falls-Swift River hydroelectric project, according to a survey conducted on behalf of a local group.

The poll, conducted and monitored by Toronto-based research firm Protean Strategies, indicated an average of more than 83 per cent those surveyed answered no to the question, "do you think the proposed power plant at Bala Falls should be built?"

The percentage of no answers increased to 85 per cent for people who identified themselves as living in the POC 1A0 postal code, where the proposed power plant would be located.

The study was sponsored and paid for by The Bala Voice, a group of Bala residents. Ian McDonald, a representative of the group, said his organization is comprised of about a dozen people living along the

Moon River.

"We just decided that we would sponsor this survey, because we are concerned about the way (the plant) looks like it is going to go," he said. "We thought the silent majority was being ignored and it turns out we were right. I think (the survey's result) is meaningful and I think it is creditable since it was an independently conducted survey. We went over backwards to make sure it was a neutral question."

According to findings posted on the Bala Voice Facebook page, an online survey was conducted between Aug. 11 and Sept. 1.

"This is a very strong sample size for a township the size of Muskoka (Lakes)," said Laurence Bernstein, managing partner of Protean Strategies, who states it has conducted opinion polls for a variety of governmental, non-governmental and private sector organizations since its incep-

# Put former employee's actions on the record



I own a small business. Several years ago I employed a young woman for approximately four years.

I have a habit of falling for sob stories and throughout her time with my company we assisted her with small amounts of money.

She told stories about how horrible her childhood had been and how unsupportive her boyfriend was, crying and all.

She asked me to assist with rent for a new apartment as her current one was a basement and the dampness was affecting her health.

She called one evening to say she was in hospital with life-threatening anemia. She confided that she was afraid of dying and had never been on a holiday.

I took the bait, sending her and her boyfriend on an all-expense paid trip with an additional thousand dollars spending money.

Later it turned out that she had never been sick, she was pregnant! I made the decision not to call police because it seemed unfair to penalize the unborn child. I just ended the employment.

My dilemma is that now she is studying to become a Chartered General Accountant. Do I contact the police and file charges or just hope that she sees an easy mark and will not repeat the fraud?

Oh, she'll repeat it. And the really spiky thing is, with her new skill set, she'll parlay her talent for deception into way more money than she was able to suck from you.

Admittedly, she'll have a tough time finding another mark as easy. Toughest up, girl. I won't go so far as to say your

guiltibility was complicit in her fraud. A kind heart is, after all, a lovely thing. But you won't own a business long if you let people like this take advantage of you; there are lots more lurking in the woodwork, waiting to crawl out and suck blood from folks like you.

At this point, the police won't have much interest in your story.

While your former employee obviously lied, her deception wouldn't likely qualify as fraud in a criminal sense.

In any event, too much time has passed and there wasn't enough money involved to warrant a major investigation.

That horse, as they say, has left the barn.

Perhaps a more productive avenue would be to approach the Regulation Department of Chartered General (Professional) Accountants of Ontario.

They're in transition right now: CGAs recently became part of the larger group called Chartered Professional Accountants (CPAs), for your purposes, that doesn't matter.

# Take the pain out of treat time



When I offer my dog a treat, she takes it roughly, biting down on my fingers. It hurts badly. My concern is that she will bite down on a child's hand causing injury. We have taught this dog the "leave it" command but that has not helped. How do I teach her to be gentle?

Leave it is a beneficial exercise. However, bite inhibition is the problem. It is about jaw control, not self-control.

Poor bite inhibition is common in dogs that were separated too early from littermates. Puppies learn jaw control during play. Puppies yelp if play becomes too rough and play temporarily stops. It's a brief timeout, telling the offending dog to play nice or else the play will end. With repeated practice, the dogs learn bite inhibition, the art of jaw control.

Owners can make significant gains by leading in on jaw pressure. I've protective gear such as sturdy gardening gloves for extreme cases. Start exercises with kibble instead of treats to make initial training easier. Add more tempting food only when the dog demonstrates it is capable of

taking the treats consistently with restraint.

Initially, the training goal is to eliminate the rough and painful grabbing of food. Wait to address moderate pressure temporarily. Too rigid initial expectations means the dog will be wrong too often. Dogs will also fail to learn how to control the pressure they are exerting.

Feed your dog's kibble by hand. If the dog takes the food roughly, say "ouch." Withdraw your hand and the piece of food. There is no need to yell. Saying the word is enough to mark that the dog was taking food too roughly.

Keep trying until the dog takes the food with medium jaw pressure. Say "yes" and give it the piece of food. Continue practicing, teaching the dog that it needs to take food politely in order to have it.

Once this has been sufficiently practised, work with dry dog treats. Gradually work up to tempting, high-value foods. Once owners have softened their dog's mouth, they can repeat all the steps of the exercise, only now they can expect the dog to show even more restraint. Raise the bar so the dog learns to take all food with a soft and gentle mouth.

When it comes to children, always err on the side of caution. Children should learn to place treats in the palm of their hand so dogs lick up

the food. They should only offer treats if given permission from a responsible adult who knows that the dog is kid friendly.

Your young dog is extremely social and thinks everyone should pet him. Most people fuss over him. I feel torn because I want my dog visiting with people. I do not want him rushing off and pulling me. Is there a way to do both?

Training a dog not to pull is all about consistency and practice. The steps to teach loose leash walking are rather simple. Teach the dog to pay attention to you. Reward the dog for following and staying next to you. Do not allow the dog to pull you — ever.

As owners, we often feel badly when setting such tight rules. There is a way around this problem. Teach the dog a "go visit" command. The dog learns it must walk politely on leash. However, at the owner's discretion, the dog may be given permission to visit with a friend or neighbour. By using a "go visit" command, owners can reward their dogs with visits for good behaviour. This strengthens leash manners even further.

Leave it is a beneficial exercise. However, bite inhibition is the problem. It is about jaw control, not self-control.

Poor bite inhibition is common in dogs that were separated too early from littermates. Puppies learn jaw control during play. Puppies yelp if play becomes too rough and play temporarily stops. It's a brief time-out, telling the offending dog to play nice or else the play will end. With repeated practice, the dogs learn bite inhibition, the act of jaw control.

Owners can make significant gains by honing in on jaw restraint. Use protective gear such as sturdy gardening gloves for extreme cases. Start exercises with kibble instead of treats to make initial training easier. Add more tempting food only when the dog demonstrates it is capable of

taking the treats consistently with restraint.

Initially, the training goal is to eliminate the rough and painful grabbing of food. Wait to address moderate pressure temporarily. Too rigid initial expectations means the dog will be wrong too often. Dogs will also fail to learn how to control the pressure they are exerting.

Feed your dog's kibble by hand. If the dog takes the food roughly, say "ouch." Withdraw your hand and the piece of food. There is no need to yell. Saying the word is enough to mark that the dog was taking food too roughly.

Keep trying until the dog takes the food with medium jaw pressure. Say "yes" and give it the piece of food. Continue practicing, teaching the dog that it needs to take food politely in order to have it. Once this has been sufficiently practiced, work with dry dog treats. Gradually work up to tempting, high-value foods. Once owners have softened their dog's mouth, they can repeat all the steps of the exercise, only now they can expect the dog to show even more restraint. Raise the bar so the dog learns to take all food with a soft and gentle mouth.

When it comes to children, always err on the side of caution. Children should learn to place treats in the palm of their hand so dogs lick up

the food. They should only offer treats if given permission from a responsible adult who knows that the dog is kid friendly.

Our young dog is extremely social and thinks everyone should pet him. Most people fuss over him. I feel torn because I want my dog visiting with people. I do not want him rushing off and pulling me. Is there a way to do both?

Training a dog not to pull is all about consistency and practice. The steps to teach loose leash walking are rather simple. Teach the dog to pay attention to you. Reward the dog for following and staying next to you. Do not allow the dog to pull you — ever.

As owners, we often feel badly when setting such tight rules. There is a way around this problem. Teach the dog a "go visit" command. The dog learns it must walk politely on leash. However, at the owner's discretion, the dog may be given permission to visit with a friend or neighbour. By using a "go visit" command, owners can reward their dogs with visits for good behaviour. 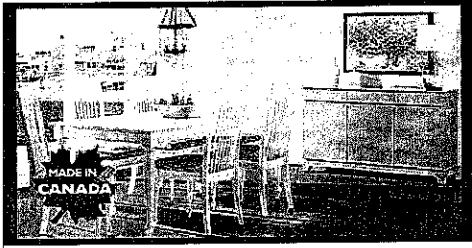
## WRITTEN HEARING


