

Annual Disbursement Report for 2014 - Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LEAP) Funds - Kitchener Utilities Natural Gas

<u>Comments:</u> All applicants are assisted in one way or another through our coordinated Waterloo Region Energy Assistance Program (WREAP), which is why there were no (zero) applicants who were denied.

In our community, Provincial Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative (CHPI) funds were used to cover all utility arrears between January 1 and March 31 of 2014. If these funds were not available, LEAP funds for Kitchener Utilities would have been exhausted in March.

In addition to LEAP funds, \$92,584 was provided to Kitchener Utilities customers through the CHPI Funds (\$43,774), and other municipal funding (\$48,810).
