## Must pay restitution for damaged vehicle

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The Ontario Court of Justice, Criminal Division, convened in Pembroke on Tuesday, Aug. 26. Presiding was Justice Grant Radley-Walters. Representing the Crown Attorney's office was Anya Kourtnaar and federal Crown Tim McCann

• Eric Parisien, of Pembroke, pleaded guilty to committing mischief under \$5,000 and theft under \$5,000. On Aug. 9, 2015 at 1:30 a.m., police were called by witnesses who heard the sounds of glass being smashed in a field near the intersection of Nelson Street and Mackay Street. When officers arrived, they found a parked street sweeper had been heavily damaged with four mirrors and a tail light smashed. They also discovered a box of electronics had been ripped out of the interior cab and gravel had been poured into the gas tank. The damaged was assessed at \$3,130. Parisien was one of three male suspects arrested near the scene. Then on Âug. 18 video surveillance taken at a Laurentian Valley boxstore showed the accused stuffing electronic games into a backpack. He left the premises without paying and rode off on a bike. He has no criminal record. Recognizing 12 days pre-sentence custody, Radley-Walters granted a conditional discharge, followed by 12 months probation and 50 hours of community service. The accused must also pay his share of restitution for the damaged vehicle at

• Sean Fitzgerald pleaded guilty to guilty to possession of a substance. On

alcohol exceeded 0.08. At 4 p.m. on June 14, 2015, police investigated a traffic complaint on Doran Road. They were alerted by a motorist to a car swerving and striking the shoulder. The witness reported the car swerved into oncoming traffic narrowly missing another vehicle at the intersection of Doran Road and Forest Lea Road. When officers pulled over the suspect vehicle, they noted the driver, identified as the accused, had blood shot eyes. He subsequently failed the roadside screening device. His blood alcohol levels were later determined through a forensic calculation estimating his readings between 220 and 275 milligrams of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood. He has no criminal record. Radley-Walters imposed a \$1,500 fine and a \$450 victim fine surcharge, followed by 12 months probation and a one-year driving prohibition.

• Ronald Stringer, of Madawaska Valley, pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle while his blood alcohol exceeded 0.08. On Nov. 23, 2014, the accused had consumed up to eight beers before climbing behind the wheel to drive to the Beer Store in Barry's Bay. He was pulled over by officers and taken to the Killaloe detachment. His blood alcohol showed 200 and 210 milligrams of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood. He has no criminal record. Radley-Walters imposed a \$1,000 fine and a \$300 victim fine surcharge followed by 12 months probation and a one-year driving prohibition.

Ian Severin, of Pembroke, pleaded

May 22, 2015, police executed a Controlled Drugs and Substances Act search warrant at a residence on First Avenue North in the city. They seized 19 grams of marijuana, a cellphone and \$120 in cash inside the home along with packaging material. In an outside shed, they recov ered another five grams of marijuana. The accused has no criminal record. Radley-Walters imposed a \$500 fine and a \$150 victim fine surcharge.

• Daniel Tysick, of Pembroke, pleaded guilty to breaching his probation. On Aug. 15, 2015, officers approached a vehicle with temporary tags parked in downtown Pembroke. They spoke with the accused learning that he was under probation conditions as part of a 90-day intermittent sentence. They found 0.5 grams of marijuana on his person. Radley-Walters imposed a 30-day jail sentence and a \$100 victim fine surcharge.

• Robyn Ditmar, of Pembroke, pleaded guilty to fraud over \$5,000 and breaching her probation. Between Feb. 2 and Sept. 18, 2014, the accused made \$51.730 in Internet bank transactions without a family member's knowledge or permission. She also failed to complete community service hours. Radley-Walters sentenced her to 12 months in jail, followed by 18 months probation.

Joseph Seguin, of Renfrew, pleaded guilty to theft under \$5,000. On Feb. 21, 2015, police investigated a theft at the Renfrew Flea Market. A vendor reported seeing the accused take two die cast metal racing cars and not paying for home, they found the two stolen cars on a shelf. Radley-Walters sentenced him to 42 days in jail, followed by 12 months probation. He also imposed a \$100 victim

• Philip Cooper pleaded guilty to breaching his probation. On July 28, 2015, the accused approached a female acquaintance in the parking lot of a Laurentian Valley boxstore and spoke to her in violation of a court order. After the brief conversation, he drove away. Police later confirmed the incident through video surveillance. Sentencing has been adjourned until Oct. 27.

• Joshua Hiltz, of Pembroke, pleaded



guilty to breaching his probation. On May 26, 2015, witnesses reported seeing the accused consuming alcohol in violation of a court order imposed that very day. Sentencing has been adjoured until



You have the right to information regarding this application and to be involved in the

- You can become an active participant (called an intervenor). Apply by September 8, 2015 or the hearing will go ahead without you and you will not receive any further notice of the proceeding.

There are two types of OEB hearings - oral and written. Enbridge has applied for a written hearing. The OEB is considering this request. If you think an oral hearing is needed, you can write to the OEB to explain why by **September 8, 2015**.

#### PRIVACY

If you write a letter of comment, your name and the content of your letter will be put on the public record and the OEB website. However, your personal telephone number, home address and e-mail address will be removed. If you are a business, all your information will remain public. If you apply to become an intervenor, all information will be public.

This hearing will be held under section 90(1) of the Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998, S.O. 1998 c.15 (Schedule B).
