Chapleau Public Utilities Corporation has applied to the Ontario Energy Board to raise its electricity distribution rates effective May 1, 2019. If the application is approved as filed, a typical residential customer and a typical general service customer of Chapleau Public Utilities Corporation would see the following increases:

Residential (750 kWh)	\$1.96 per month
General Service < 50 kW (2,000 kWh)	\$17.40 per month

Other customers, including businesses, may also be affected.

The above noted residential customer bill impact includes reductions under the Distribution Rate Protection program.

THE ONTARIO ENERGY BOARD IS HOLDING A COMMUNITY MEETING

The Ontario Energy Board (OEB) is hosting a meeting on February 5, 2019 at the Royal Canadian Legion, 33 Young Street, Chapleau, Ontario, starting at 6:30 p.m. (doors open at 6 p.m.) so that you can:

- Learn more about Chapleau Public Utilities' costs and rate application.
- Find out how the OEB will review the application.
- Get involved and provide your comments about the application to the OEB.

THE ONTARIO ENERGY BOARD IS HOLDING A PUBLIC HEARING

The OEB will hold a public hearing to consider the application filed by Chapleau Public Utilities. During the hearing, we will question Chapleau Public Utilities on its case for a rate increase. We will also hear questions and arguments from individual customers and from groups that represent Chapleau Public Utilities' customers. At the end of this hearing, the OEB will decide what, if any, rate increase will be allowed.

Distributors such as Chapleau Public Utilities will typically apply for a full review of their rates every five years. Any rate changes for the years in between are made by applying an OEB-approved formula which is tied to inflation and other factors intended to promote efficiency. You may not get notice of future rate changes made by applying the formula.

The OEB is an independent and impartial public agency. We make decisions that serve the public interest. Our goal is to promote a financially viable and efficient energy sector that provides you with reliable energy services at a reasonable cost.

BE INFORMED AND HAVE YOUR SAY

You have the right to information regarding this application and to be involved in the process.

 You can review Chapleau Public Utilities' application on the OEB's website now.

- You can attend the OEB's community meeting (date, time and place set out above) where you can ask questions, make comments and voice your concerns.
- You can file a letter with your comments, which will be considered during the hearing.
- You can become an active participant (called an intervenor). Apply by January 28, 2019 or the hearing will go ahead without you and you will not receive any further notice of the proceeding.
- At the end of the process, you can review the OEB's decision and its reasons on our website.

ORAL VS. WRITTEN HEARINGS

There are two types of OEB hearings – oral and written. Chapleau Public Utilities' has applied for a written hearing. The OEB will determine at a later date whether to proceed by way of a written or oral hearing. If you think an oral hearing is needed, you can write to the OEB to explain why by **January 28, 2019.**

PRIVACY

If you write a letter of comment, your name and the content of your letter will be put on the public record and the OEB website. However, your personal telephone number, home address and email address will be removed. If you are a business, all your information will remain public. If you apply to become an intervenor, all information will be public.

This hearing will be held under section 78 of the Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998, S.O. 1998 c.15 (Schedule B).
