Was the Project information provided to the community?</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Yes <input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p>The Notice of Project Commencement (NoC) and Information Session was sent through Canada Post on March 18, 2019 to Batchewana First Nation (BFN). Following that, the Notice of Project Commencement and Information Session was sent via email on March 19, 2019.</p> <p>The Project team first sent an email to BFN in May 2019 to inform the First Nation that the original Notice of Commencement (NoC) email had been returned as undeliverable, and requested a new email address. A new contact email was provided by BFN on May 28, 2019 and the Project information was resent to the community at the provided email address.</p> <p>On June 13, 2019 a representative from BFN spoke with the Project team via telephone and the Project information was also re-sent to the First Nation representative.</p> <p>In November 2019, the Project Manager for the Municipalities emailed the BFN representative to determine if further information was required; she provided updated links to Project resources, and requested a telephone call and meeting date to discuss next steps.</p> <p>A face to face meeting took place in Thunder Bay on November 26, 2019 between the Project team and representatives from BFN. At the meeting, a presentation of the most recent Project information was provided in electronic and hard copy. Story boards containing additional information about the Project were set up in the meeting room for BFN representatives to peruse and learn more about the proposed Project.</p>

	<p>The presentation materials regarding the Project were emailed as a follow-up to the two BFN representatives who attended the presentation in Thunder Bay.</p>

Communication has been conducted by telephone, email, as well as in person.</p> <p>The BFN responded quickly to requests for meetings and provided valuable insight about the community to the Project team at held a meeting in Thunder Bay on November 26, 2019.</p>

Did the community members or representatives have any questions or concerns?</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Yes <input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p>At the meeting on November 26, 2019, the community representatives for BFN asked about the status of the OEB process, Project timeline, the organizational structure of the LDC, and who will be shareholders of the future LDC. The Project representatives provided an update on the OEB application process as of November 2019, the Interrogatory process, and informed BFN that the five proponent municipalities would be equal shareholders of the future LDC.</p> <p>BFN asked about the lands that could be potentially impacted by the proposed Project and asked questions related to potential environmental impacts of LNG.</p> <p>BFN presented the importance of environmental focus and maintaining the integrity of eco-systems within their traditional area to the Project team. BFN also informed the Project team about the ancestral lands and traditional territory areas of BFN. Questions were asked regarding archeological work/ protocols conducted in the area.</p> <p>The Project representatives highlighted the geographic areas proposed in the OEB application and Environmental Reports, and discussed the features of LNG, including during conversion, transportation and customer delivery.</p> <p>The BFN asked to be informed about future archeological or environmental work on their traditional lands.</p>

<p>1. Was the Project information provided to the community?</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Yes <input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p>The Notice of Project Commencement (NoC) and Information Session was sent through Canada Post on March 18, 2019 to Biinjitiwaabik Zaaging Anishinaabek (BZA). Following that, the Notice of Project Commencement and Information Session was sent via email on March 19, 2019.</p> <p>The Project team called BZA regarding the Project on June 11, 2019 and was advised to call back on Friday June 14, 2019. The Project team attempted to call BZA back on the requested date but there was no response. A telephone message was left at the Band Office for Chief Hardy.</p> <p>On June 18, 2019, the Project team had a telephone call with a BZA representative which was followed up by an email from the community to the Project representative a few days later. The BZA representative included Chief Hardy and other members of Council on the email chain. The Project team and Chief Hardy exchanged several emails to gain clarity on the Project components and the proponent municipalities.</p> <p>On July 4, 2019, the Project team emailed Chief Hardy to propose a meeting to discuss the Project. Chief Hardy responded and provided the name of the appropriate BZA contact person for the Project.</p> <p>Several emails and telephone calls were exchanged between the Project team and the BZA representative. Two consultation session dates were proposed: July 14 or July 28, 2020.</p>

	<p>On July 28, 2019, the Project team held a community open house with members of BZA in the community. The BZA representative requested to be updated as the Project proceeds and noted BZA had no concerns at this point.</p>

Following that, the Notice of Project Commencement and Information Session was sent via email on March 19, 2019.</p> <p>On June 11, 2019, a Project representative spoke with the GFN Band Manager and resent him a link to the Project website and the NoC via email. The Project notification included a map of the Project location.</p> <p>On July 4, 2019, the Project team followed up on the email sent on June 11, 2019 to find out if the representative had any questions or concerns regarding the Project information that had been provided to the community.</p> <p>On July 14, 2019 the Project team called the GFN representative and discussed the Project on the telephone. A request was made by the GFN representative for a meeting with the GFN leadership and community members. A follow-up email was sent by the Project team which included a link to the Project website.</p> <p>The Project representative sent follow-up emails to request a meeting date with GFN to discuss the Project. The GFN representative responded on August 1, 2019 noting that the community was interested in meeting and requested to schedule a meeting date for early September due to upcoming elections.</p> <p>The Project team called the GFN representative in September to request a meeting date but there was no response. At the end of September 2019, the GFN representative requested the Project team call on October 1, 2019.</p> <p>On October 1, 2019, the Project team called the GFN representative and left a voicemail. On October 16, 2019, the Project team called the GFN representative and discussed an introductory meeting and agreed to provide an honorarium for GFN leadership/technical representative attendees. The GFN representative noted they would determine a suitable meeting date, likely for some time in November.</p>
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	<p>On November 5, 2019, the Project Manager for the proponent municipalities emailed the GFN representative to follow up on the previous request for an introductory meeting with leadership/technical representatives from GFN.</p> <p>The Project Manager spoke with the GFN representative on the telephone on November 5, 2019 in response to the email. GFN informed the Project Manager that he would liaise with First Nation representatives and be in further contact with the Project Manager with a confirmed meeting date for either November 25 or 26, 2019.</p> <p>On November 22, 2019, the GFN representative informed the Project Manager that the First Nation representatives were no longer available on November 25 or 26. GFN indicated that they would try to confirm a meeting for December 11 or 12, 2019 instead.</p> <p>The Project Manager confirmed a meeting with GFN on December 12, 2019. The meeting was held at the Valhalla Inn with ten (10) members of GFN present, as well as a representative from Four Rivers Environmental Services from the Matawa First Nations Tribal Council. The Project Manager provided the members hard copies of the presentation slides and delivered a presentation to those in attendance. The presentation included a Project overview and an understanding of the proposed Project purpose including information on the applicant Municipalities, Liquefied Natural Gas, Purpose of Project, Project Overview, Delivery Systems, Project Scope, The Developer, and The Schedule. Story boards containing additional information about the Project were set up in the conference room for attendees to peruse and learn more about the proposed Project.</p>

An in-person meeting was held on December 12, 2019 to discuss the Project with community members.</p>

They also asked if the proposed Project will be developed on Municipal land. A Council member from GFN asked whether or not the proponent municipalities had approached the First Nations to lead the LNG Project first.</p> <p>The Project team representatives explained that the current OEB application is for a Leave to Construct and Gas Supply contract specific to the five municipalities to deliver natural gas to local customers. It was communicated that the gas supply is coming from the Nipigon LNG Plant, which is a separate Project from the municipal Project. It was explained that the Project infrastructure will be on lands located within the five Municipal boundaries and that the infrastructure will be constructed in a non-intrusive manner alongside existing roadways and service systems.</p> <p>The Project team representatives informed GFN that there are potential opportunities for expansion of this type of LNG Project to other municipalities and First Nations in the future.</p>

The Project team was directed to contact John O'nabigon regarding the NoC and if the community has any questions.</p> <p>In the months of June and July, 2019, the Project team attempted to call the LLFN representative and left voicemails and follow-up emails, asking if the LLFN had any questions or concerns regarding the Project.</p> <p>The Project team spoke with the Band Manager via telephone on July 9, 2019. The Band Manager confirmed that the community does not have any concerns regarding the Project and requested to be updated as the Project progresses.</p>

Was the Project information provided to the community?</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Yes <input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p>The Notice of Project Commencement (NoC) and Information Session was sent through Canada Post on March 18, 2019 to the Metis Nation of Ontario (MNO). Following that, the Notice of Project Commencement and Information Session was sent via email on March 19, 2019.</p> <p>On April 16, 2019, the Region 2 Consultation Committee requested a consultation meeting with the Municipalities and Stantec regarding the Project. A draft budget was provided to the Project team representative by Jaqueline Barry, Consultation Assessment Coordinator at MNO. The Project team contacted the MNO Region 2 Consultation Coordinator to schedule a meeting on May 8 from 3:00 – 5:00 p.m.</p> <p>A meeting with Project team representatives and members from Region 2, MNO Thunder Bay Metis Council, MNO Greenstone Metis Council, MNO Superior North Shore Metis Council occurred on May 8, 2019. During the meeting, an overview of the Project was presented to the representatives.</p> <p>Throughout the months of June, July, August and September, 2019, the Project team representative followed up with members of MNO to ask if the MNO had any further questions or comments regarding the Project. Additional meetings and telephone calls were offered to MNO to follow-up on any outstanding questions or concerns.</p> <p>The MNO representative responded acknowledged receipt of the correspondence and requested that all future correspondence items be sent to the general consultations email address of the MNO.</p> <p>On October 1, 2019, the Project team representative provided an overview of the Project activities since the May meeting with the MNO, and provided a link to the updated Project website (which contains the five Environmental Reports). Copies of the May meeting minutes were also resent to MNO as part of this email.</p>

The Project team representatives had multiple information exchanges regarding the Project. An in-person meeting was held between the Project team representatives and MNO on May 8, 2019. Numerous delegates representing members from Region 2, MNO Thunder Bay Metis Council, MNO Greenstone Metis Council and MNO Superior North Shore Metis Council were in attendance.</p>

Did the community members or representatives have any questions or concerns?</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Yes <input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p>Email correspondence from Jacqueline Barry on April 16, 2019 requested a consultation meeting regarding the proposed Project to discuss whether it had the potential to cause adverse effects to the Métis way of life. The Project representative responded on April 25, 2019 that the intent of Project is to help improve the quality of life of residents and the competitiveness of business in northwest Ontario by significantly lowering the cost of energy.</p> <p>During the face-to-face meeting which took place on May 8, 2019, the MNO representatives asked numerous questions related to LNG, the comparative costs of LNG as a fuel source, the supply and transport of LNG from Nipigon to the Municipalities, local community economic development opportunities, and job creation related to the Project, as well as future maintenance and repair services. The Project team consultants answered any concerns and questions asked during the meeting, using the presentation slides and story boards as reference materials.</p> <p>It was communicated at the meeting that the Project intends to bring local community economic development and employment & training opportunities to the area.</p>

The MNO representative responded to the last correspondence noting the information update was passed along to the MNO Region 2 Consultation Committee.</p>

Was the Project information provided to the community?</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Yes <input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p>The Notice of Project Commencement (NoC) and Information Session was sent through Canada Post on March 18, 2019 to Michipicoten First Nation (MFN). Following that, the Notice of Project Commencement and Information Session was sent via email on March 19, 2019.</p> <p>The Project team called MFN and left a voice message for the Chief on June 10, 2019. On June 12, 2019, the Project team called Aaron Bunstead (MFN Land and Resources representative) and left a voicemail to discuss the Project. A follow-up email was also sent to Aaron Bunstead on the same day.</p> <p>On June 21, 2019, Aaron Bunstead acknowledged receipt of the NoC letter and requested a meeting to further discuss the Project.</p> <p>The Project team contacted the MFN representative and scheduled a telephone call for July 5, 2019 to discuss the Project in more detail. Following the telephone call on July 5, 2019, an in-person meeting was requested.</p> <p>The MFN representative contacted the Project team with several dates for an in-person meeting. The Project team travelled to MFN on September 25, 2019 to meet with community representatives. A municipal representative (CAO of the Township of Wawa) attended the meeting, as well as environmental consultants from Stantec, Indigenous Relations consultants from Stantec and the Project Manager for the proponent municipalities. During the meeting, the Project representatives provided a presentation of the proposed Project, provided environmental information and discussed potential opportunities for collaborations between the Municipality of Wawa and MFN.</p> <p>The Project team representative sent a follow-up message thanking MFN for the meeting and also included a copy of the Environmental Report (Wawa) with supporting comments included from Colliers Project Leaders, who provided peer review services on the ER to the Project.</p> <p>On November 12, 2019, MFN informed the Project Manager by email that a discussion had taken place between MFN and ENDM about acquiring funding to undertake an independent environmental review of the Project. The Project Manager immediately responded to MFN to offer the technical advisory services of the Municipalities' peer review consultants at Colliers Project Leaders to support MFN. The Project Manager offered to set up an introductory meeting</p>
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	<p>with the technical consultant and a discussion to explore options to further assist MFN in addressing their questions or concerns.</p>
<p>2. Was the community responsive/did you have direct contact with the community?</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Yes <input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p>The MFN representatives were responsive and multiple information exchanges took place regarding the Project. An in-person meeting was held between the Project team representatives and MFN representatives on September 25, 2019.</p>

Did the community members or representatives have any questions or concerns?</p> <p><input checked="" type="checkbox"/> Yes <input type="checkbox"/> No</p>	<p>During the skype meeting on July 5, 2019, MFN representatives asked the following questions:</p> <p>Q1. Why were the First Nation communities along the North Shore not included in the project? A concern was noted related to natural gas fracking and environmental implications. It was communicated that MFN would oppose any natural gas fracking activities.</p> <p>Q2. As for next steps, MFN would either like to be included as a partner or have the ability to obtain natural gas from the line.</p> <p>The Project team representative responded to the questions highlighting that the initial application is between five Municipalities but that there is opportunity for future expansion of the project to other communities or First Nations. It was also communicated that any communities would have to demonstrate a strong business case with sufficient end user demand for LNG to be a feasible natural gas option.</p> <p>The Project team representative informed MFN that the municipalities would not be connecting directly to the Trans Canada Pipeline or conducting any fracking activities. MFN was informed that the Project includes trucking LNG from the Nipigon Plant to local municipal storage depots where it will feed into local distribution systems in each municipality.</p>

	<p>At the face to face meeting, concerns and questions were raised regarding archeological work/ protocols, as well as the potential Environmental impacts of the Project. The MFN emphasized the importance of land and Environmental preservation (lands, waterways, wildlife, habitats and other eco-systems) in their traditional territory.</p> <p>The Project team representatives answered all of the MFN representatives' questions related to the Environmental features and implications of the Project. Maps were provided as well as information about the local delivery system locations and potential environmental footprints of the storage depots including size and scale.
