Application for rates and other charges to be effective May 1, 2020

1 INTRODUCTION AND SUMMARY

Through this Decision and Rate Order, the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) approves the incentive rate-setting mechanism (IRM) application filed by Fort Frances Power Corporation (Fort Frances Power) for new rates effective May 1, 2020.

Fort Frances Power serves approximately 3,750 mostly residential and commercial electricity customers in the Town of Fort Frances. The company is seeking the OEB's approval for the rates it charges to distribute electricity to its customers, as is required of licensed and rate-regulated distributors in Ontario.

A distributor may choose one of three rate-setting methodologies approved by the OEB. Each of these is explained in the <u>Handbook for Utility Rate Applications</u>.

Fort Frances Power's application is based on a Price Cap Incentive Rate-setting option (Price Cap IR), with a five-year term. The Price Cap IR option involves the setting of rates through a cost of service application in the first year. Mechanistic price cap adjustments, based on inflation and the OEB's assessment of the distributor's efficiency, are typically then approved through IRM applications in each of the ensuing four (adjustment) years.

As a result of the OEB's findings in this Decision, there will be a monthly total bill increase of \$1.05 before taxes and the Ontario Electricity Rebate¹ for a residential customer consuming 750 kWh, effective May 1, 2020.

2 THE PROCESS

This Decision is being issued by delegated authority, without a hearing, under section 6 of the *Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998* (the OEB Act).

The OEB follows a standardized and streamlined process for hearing IRM applications filed under Price Cap IR. In each adjustment year of a Price Cap IR term, the OEB prepares a Rate Generator Model that includes, as a placeholder, information from the distributor's past proceedings and annual reporting requirements.² A distributor will then review and complete the Rate Generator Model, and include it with its application.

It also calculates rate riders for the disposition of deferral and variance account balances. During the course of an IRM proceeding, the Rate Generator Model may be updated in order to make any necessary corrections, or to incorporate new rate-setting parameters as they become available.

Fort Frances Power filed its application on November 25, 2019 under section 78 of the OEB Act and in accordance with Chapter 3 of the OEB's *Filing Requirements for Incentive Rate-Setting Applications* (Filing Requirements) and <u>Addendum to Filing</u> *Requirements for Electricity Distribution Rate Applications*.

The application was supported by pre-filed written evidence and a completed Rate Generator Model. During the course of the proceeding, the applicant responded to OEB staff questions through emails and phone calls and, where required, updated and clarified the evidence.

3 ORGANIZATION OF THE DECISION

In this Decision, the OEB addresses the following issues, and provides reasons for approving or denying Fort Frances Power's proposals relating to each of them:

- Price Cap Adjustment
- Retail Transmission Service Rates
- Group 1 Deferral and Variance Accounts

In the final section, the OEB addresses the steps to implement the final rates that flow from this Decision.

This Decision does not address rates and charges approved by the OEB in previous proceedings, which are not part of the scope of an IRM proceeding (such as specific service charges³ and loss factors). No further approvals are required to continue to include these items on a distributor's Tariff of Rates and Charges.

4 PRICE CAP ADJUSTMENT

Fort Frances Power seeks to increase its rates, effective May 1, 2020, based on a mechanistic rate adjustment using the OEB-approved *inflation minus X-factor* formula applicable to Price Cap IR applications.

The components of the Price Cap IR adjustment formula applicable to Fort Frances Power are set out in Table 4.1, below. Inserting these components into the formula results in a 1.70% increase to Fort Frances Power's rates: 1.70% = 2.00% - (0.00% + 0.30%).

The inflation factor of 2.00% applies to all Price Cap IR applications for the 2020 rate year.

The X-factor is the sum of the productivity factor and the stretch factor. It is a productivity offset that will vary among different groupings of distributors. Subtracting the X-factor from inflation ensures that rates decline in real, constant-dollar terms, providing distributors with a tangible incentive to improve efficiency or else experience declining net income.

The productivity component of the X-factor is based on industry conditions over a historical study period and applies to all Price Cap IR and Annual IR Index applications for the 2020 rate year.

The stretch factor component of the X-factor is distributor specific. The OEB has established five stretch factor groupings, each within a range from 0.00% to 0.60%. The

stretch factor assigned to any particular distributor is based on the distributor's total cost performance as benchmarked against other distributors in Ontario. The most efficient distributor would be assigned the lowest stretch factor of 0.00%. Conversely, a higher stretch factor would be applied to a less efficient distributor (in accordance with its cost performance relative to expected levels) to reflect the incremental productivity gains that the distributor is expected to achieve. The stretch factor assigned to Fort Frances Power is 0.30%.

Findings

The OEB finds that Fort Frances Power's request for a 1.70% rate adjustment is in accordance with the annually updated parameters set by the OEB. The adjustment is approved, and Fort Frances Power's new rates shall be effective May 1, 2020.

The adjustment applies to distribution rates (fixed and variable) uniformly across all customer classes.⁷

5 RETAIL TRANSMISSION SERVICE RATES

Distributors charge retail transmission service rates (RTSRs) to their customers in order to recover the amounts they pay to a transmitter, a host distributor, or both, for transmission services. All transmitters charge Uniform Transmission Rates (UTRs) to distributors connected to the transmission system. Host distributors charge host-RTSRs to distributors embedded within the host's distribution system. Each of these rates are OEB-approved.

Fort Frances Power is transmission connected and is requesting approval to adjust the RTSRs that it charges its customers to reflect the currently approved rates that it pays for transmission services included in Table 5.1.

Findings

Fort Frances Power's proposed adjustment to its RTSRs is approved. The RTSRs were adjusted based on the interim 2020 UTRs, which were incorporated into the rate model to adjust the RTSRs that Fort Frances Power will charge its customers.

Any differences resulting from the approval of final 2020 UTRs will be captured in Accounts RSVA – Retail Transmission Network charge 1584 and Retail Transmission Connection charge 1586.

6 GROUP 1 DEFERRAL AND VARIANCE ACCOUNTS

In each year of an IRM term, the OEB will review a distributor's Group 1 deferral and variance accounts in order to determine whether their total balance should be disposed.⁹ OEB policy requires that Group 1 accounts be disposed if they exceed (as a debit or credit) a pre-set disposition threshold of \$0.001 per kWh, unless a distributor can justify why balances should not be disposed.¹⁰ If the balance does not exceed the threshold, a distributor may elect to request disposition.

The 2018 actual year-end total balance for Fort Frances Power Group 1 accounts including interest projected to April 30, 2020 is a credit of \$22,870. This amount represents a total credit claim of \$0.0003 per kWh, which does not exceed the disposition threshold, and the utility has not requested disposition.

In 2018, the OEB suspended its approvals of Group 1 rate riders on a final basis pending the development of further accounting guidance on commodity pass-through variance accounts.¹¹ The OEB then issued accounting guidance¹² on the commodity accounts on February 21, 2019. In this letter, the OEB indicated that it expects distributors to consider the accounting guidance in the context of historical balances that have not yet been disposed on a final basis. Distributors are expected to make any adjustments needed prior to filing for final disposition.

Fort Frances Power currently performs its Regulated Price Plan (RPP) settlements with the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO) based on actual billed consumption for the month, on a one-month time-lag basis. Fort Frances Power stated that the reason for the lag was that the actual metered data used for IESO settlement purposes was not available by the 4th day following month end. Moreover, the applicant submitted that the IESO is aware of this unique settlement process, a process which is further complicated by the 1905 Historic Power Agreement, as cited in Ontario Regulation 398/10.¹³ Fort Frances Power has also indicated that it believes that its use of a one-month time-lag is still in line with the spirit of the OEB's accounting guidance because it produces an outcome (e.g. balance in the account based on actual consumption) that is consistent with that guidance.¹⁴

Account 1595 (2017)

Fort Frances Power filed the Account 1595 Analysis Workform with its current application. Fort Frances Power stated that it incorrectly billed its customers for its account 1589 Global Adjustment rate rider for the Street Lighting and GS >50 kW rate classes by using billed kW rather than kWh for 2017.

In the application, as originally filed, Fort Frances Power proposed recovery of the under-collected amounts from the affected customers using an equal monthly billing adjustment over a one-year period. In response to requests for further clarification from OEB staff, Fort Frances Power provided a calculation of adjusted kWh volumetric rate riders to adjust for the incorrect billing of customers in the Street Lighting and General Service >50 kW rate classes. The table below summarized the disposition of the uncollected balance through a separate rate rider.

Findings

The OEB finds that the account balances in Fort Frances Power's commodity pass through accounts are consistent with the OEB's February 21, 2019 accounting guidance, as the utility keeps its books open long enough to record settlement transactions in the correct calendar year. However, the OEB finds that Fort Frances Power's practice of settlement with the IESO on a one-month time-lag basis is not consistent with both the IESO's current market settlement rules¹⁶ and with the OEB's accounting guidance pertaining to Accounts 1588 and 1589. In the past, the OEB has noted the importance of standardizing the accounting procedures related to Account 1588 RSVA – Power and Account 1589 RSVA – Global Adjustment. Compliance by distributors with the OEB's standardized accounting procedures, including the completion of timely and accurate monthly RPP settlement true-up claims, is key to ensuring the integrity of the monthly wholesale electricity market data. The OEB finds that the one-month time-lag in settlement results in the overall market not being held whole in any given month.

The OEB's February 21, 2019 accounting guidance for Accounts 1588 and 1589 assumes that all distributors follow the IESO's current market settlement rules, and the settlements for a month are to be filed by the 4th business day of the following month. Being cognizant that Fort Frances Power may have unique circumstances, the OEB expects that Fort Frances Power will work towards a resolution with OEB staff, who will assess Fort Frances Power's ability to implement the guidance and then will help it to align its settlement practices with the current market rules, as appropriate.

The OEB notes that the residual balance in Account 1595 sub-account 1595 (2017) was the result of incorrect billing determinants being used for the General Service >50 kW

and Street Lighting rate classes. The OEB approves the proposed rate riders to recover the uncollected amounts from the affected customers as it believes this to be the most appropriate approach. The amounts collected from this rate rider are to continue to be recorded to Account 1595 sub-account 1595 (2017) until the sunset date of the rate rider. The distributor should bring forward the residual balance of this sub-account in a future rate proceeding consistent with the Filing Requirements.

7 IMPLEMENTATION AND ORDER

This Decision is accompanied by a Rate Generator Model, applicable supporting models, and a Tariff of Rates and Charges (Schedule A).

Model entries were reviewed in order to ensure that they are in accordance with Fort Frances Power's last cost of service decision, and to ensure that the 2019 OEBapproved Tariff of Rates and Charges, as well as the cost, revenue and consumption results from 2018, are as reported by Fort Frances Power to the OEB.

The Rate Generator Model was adjusted, where applicable, to correct any discrepancies. The Rate Generator Model incorporates the rates set out in the following table.

Each of these rates is a component of the "Regulatory Charge" on a customer's bill, established annually by the OEB through a separate, generic order. The RRRP, WMS and CBR rates were set by the OEB on December 17, 2019.¹⁷

The Smart Metering Entity Charge is a component of the "Distribution Charge" on a customer's bill, established by the OEB through a separate order. The Smart Metering Entity Charge was set by the OEB on March 1, 2018.¹⁸

In the *Report of the Board: Review of Electricity Distribution Cost Allocation Policy*,¹⁹ the OEB indicated that it will review the default province-wide microFIT charge annually to ensure it continues to reflect actual costs. In accordance with the established methodology, the OEB has calculated an updated value of \$4.55 per month²⁰ for the 2020 rate year. The Tariff of Rates and Charges attached as Schedule A reflect this updated charge.

THE ONTARIO ENERGY BOARD ORDERS THAT:

- 1. Subject to paragraph 2, the Tariff of Rates and Charges set out in Schedule A of this Decision and Rate Order is approved effective May 1, 2020 for electricity consumed or estimated to have been consumed on and after such date.
- 2. In light of the COVID-19 emergency, the Tariff of Rates and Charges set out in Schedule A of this Decision and Rate Order is approved to be implemented November 1, 2020 if Fort Frances Power Corporation notifies the OEB under paragraph 4 that it is electing to postpone the implementation of its new rates until November 1, 2020.
- 3. Any temporarily forgone distribution revenue associated with the postponement referred to in paragraph 2 may be tracked in Account 1509 Impacts Arising from the COVID-19 Emergency, Sub-account Lost Revenues.
- 4. Fort Frances Power Corporation shall, on or before April 23, 2020, file a letter with the OEB indicating whether it intends to postpone the implementation of the Tariff of Rates and Charges set out in Schedule A of this Decision and Rate Order.
- 5. If Fort Frances Power Corporation elects not to postpone the implementation of the Tariff of Rates and Charges set out in Schedule A of this Decision and Rate Order, it shall notify its customers of the rate changes no later than the delivery of the first bill reflecting the new final rates.
