Necklaces a danger

TORONTO - Parents are being asked to destroy a clear plastic necklace given to children at the recent Santa Claus Parade in Toronto.

The tiny star necklace was distributed by volunteers of SickKids Foundation during the parade and at a breakfast event in Yonge-Dundas Square.

If the necklace is pulled apart and breaks, the small parts can potentially cause choking problems.

Foundation spokeswoman Carol Duncan did not know how many were distributed in total, but believes there "weren't too many."

The necklace has a clear plastic star that illuminates and the words "Believe in Santa, Believe in SickKids" printed on it.

Mayors meet

TORONTO - Mayors from more than 30 Ontario municipalities with ties to the auto trade are meeting in Toronto later today to talk about the ailing sec-

Leaders will discuss how their communities are being affected by the industry's troubles and possible solutions. Woodstock Mayor Michael Harding

says there is a domino effect throughout Ontario when a local auto supplier cuts jobs or closes its doors. Harding also says the voice of munic-

ipalities hasn't been included in talks between the provincial and federal governments and the automakers.

Federal Industry Minister Tony Clement and Michael Bryant, Ontario's economic development minister, were in Washington trying to find out what a bailout for U.S. automakers means for Canada.

Not enough done

TORONTO - Not enough has been done to fill long-standing vacancies in the province's local public health units, Ontario's acting chief medical officer said Thursday in his annual report.

Thirteen of the province's 36 public health units didn't have a permanent medical officer of health as of Sept. 1, Dr. David Williams said in his report.

Public health units have also had trouble recruiting other health professionals, including nurses and health inspec-

tors, the report found. The province, which has been urged for years to fix the problem, has itself been without a permanent medical office of health since the late Dr. Sheela Basrur resigned in 2006.

Filling those vacant positions was the top recommendation of a 2002 report into the tainted-water tragedy in Walkerton, Ont., that killed seven people and sickened 2,500 others.

The province was also warned in a 2006 report that some health units lacked "sufficient capacity" to manage effectively while those positions remained vacant.

Yet Ontario's Liberal government still hasn't filled those jobs, said Progressive Conservative health critic Elizabeth Witmer.

Over-the-counter diagnosis feared

TORONTO - Ontario's top physicians' group says patients should never rely on pharmacists to diagnose ailments and prescribe drugs for them.

There is a proposal before the Ontario legislature to allow pharmacists to diagnose some simple maladies in their stores and write prescriptions.

The Ontario Medical Association says this could endanger patients and set medicine back in the province by a

Association president Dr. Ken Arnold says patients expect doctors to be the ultimate health-care provider, not pharmacists.


Arnold is most concerned with a recommendation that pharmacists might be able to diagnose "minor" ailments without a doctor's consent.

He says doctors "spend hours and years learning diagnostic skills.

Police say killings were murder-suicide

The deaths of four adult family members found in a Scarborough home two days ago have been deemed a triple murder and a suicide.

But Toronto Police are not yet ready to say which of the four relatives was behind the massacre or why the person killed three loved ones and the family dog before taking his or her own life.

"I'm confident that the killer was inside the house (among the dead)," Det.-Sgt. Pauline Gray said yesterday, adding no suspects are being sought and neighbours need not be afraid.

Police went to the home Wednesday morning after receiving a 911 call.

When they arrived at the small bungalow they found a note on the door that read, 'Do not enter! Call police.'

Once inside they discovered the four dead relatives and the slain pet, believed to be a caramelcoloured miniature poodle named Charlotte.

There was concern initially it was a quadruple murder.

"As the case unfolded and more forensic evidence was uncovered, it became apparent that the tragic deaths of the family was in fact a triple homicide-suicide," Gray



Police have not yet identified the family.

But neighbours have said the home was owned by Keith Delong and his wife Wanda, a retired couple believed to be in their mid-60s.

Their son Richard, who was possibly in his late-30s and suffered from a debilitating illness, also lived in the home. And neighbours said the couple's daughter, Elizabeth, was visiting the night before.

Elizabeth's husband, James Tompkin, was outside the home when police arrived and the distraught man was taken to a police station for questioning. However, he was released early yesterday.

"The male in custody was released when it was clear he was not involved in the deaths," Gray said. It now appears it was the son-in-law who made the grisly discovery while looking for his wife when she failed to come home.

The Tompkins' town-Whitby in house remained under guard by Durham police as they waited for a search warrant, which police said was just a formality at this point.

There is some speculation the family was shot, but Gray wouldn't comment on the cause of death until she gets the results of the postmortem examinations, expected to be conducted over the weekend.

The note on the door was the only note found. Some media reports

EB-2008-0190 **NOTICE OF APPLICATION AND WRITTEN HEARING FOR AN ELECTRICITY DISTRIBUTION RATE CHANGE**

Kenora Hydro Electric Corporation Ltd.

The Ontario Energy Board has received an application on November 3, 2008 under section 78 of the Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998, S.O. 1998, c.15 (Schedule B), seeking approval for changes to the rates that Kenora Hydro Electric Corporation Ltd. ("Kenora Hydro") charges for electricity distribution, to be effective May 1, 2009. The Board has assigned the application file number EB-2008-0190. The Board's decision on this application may have an effect on all of Kenora Hydro's customers. The application was filed under the Board's Guidelines for 2nd Generation Incentive Regulation, which provides for a mechanistic and formulaic adjustment to rates between cost of

Any change to the rates that Kenora Hydro charges for electricity distribution will be reflected in the delivery charges. Delivery charges are one of four regular items on residential and general service customers' electricity bills and vary depending on the amount of electricity consumed.

Kenora Hydro indicates that if the application is approved as filed, a residential customer consuming 1,000 kWh per month would experience 5.1% increase in their delivery charges. This is an approximate \$1.48 increase per month on their bill. A small general service customer consuming 2,000 kWh per month and having a monthly demand of 50 kW or lower would experience an approximate 4.0% increase in their delivery charges. This is a \$1.77 increase per month on

How to Participate in the Rate Proceeding

The Board intends to proceed with Kenora Hydro's rate change application by way of written hearing unless a party satisfies the Board that there is good reason for holding an oral hearing. If you object to a written hearing in this matter, you must provide written reasons why an oral hearing is necessar. Any objections to a written hearing must be received by the Board and copied to the applicant at the addresses below no later than December 9, 2008. The Board will not be awarding

Anyone who wishes information and material from the applicant that is in addition to the evidence filed with the Board and that is relevant to the hearing, shall request it by written interrogatories filed with the Board and delivered to the applicant on or before December 23,2008. The applicant shall file with the Board complete responses to the interrogatories and deliver them to all parties who asked interrogatories no later than January 6, 2009.

Anyone who wishes to make a submission on the application must file that written submission with the Beard and deliver it to the applicant by January 20, 2009. If the applicant wishes to respond to the submission(s), the written response must be filed with the Board and delivered to all parties who made submissions by February 3, 2009.
