**Re: EB-2010-0055 Union Gas. 2011 DSM Plan – OSEA Late Intervention
Request**

The Ontario Sustainable Energy Association (OSEA) is requesting that the Board grant a late intervention request in the above noted application and requests cost eligibility for its proposed participation.

We are advised that Ms. Joanne Clarke of Union Gas' regulatory department confirmed to OSEA that they could apply for late intervention and make the enclosed request. OSEA participated in the DSM Guidelines proceeding EB-2008-0346 and would like the opportunity to participate in this proceeding on the same basis.

We understand that the deadline for interrogatories has passed and we would not be seeking any accommodation in that regard, but propose to provide submissions on Union's application and interrogatory responses by August 4, 2010.

Further to our cost eligibility submission request for EB2-2008-0346, we would like to provide additional clarification on OSEA's mandate and membership¹ and establish that OSEA does represent a public interest issue with respect to the issues in the above noted proceedings.

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The organization was established to promote the vision of assisting Ontario to transition to 100% sustainable energy. The Board in previous decisions has noted that OSEA's mandate is to promote renewable energy and community sustainability. To clarify, renewable energy and energy efficiency are the twin pillars of sustainable energy and so OSEA has a dual mandate in two different but complementary technical areas that both support the overall goal of community sustainability. We ask that the Board recognize the other part of OSEA's mandate (energy efficiency) in determining that OSEA indeed represents a public interest issue with respect to the issues in the above noted proceeding.



² Schedule D to the GEGEA amended the objectives of the Board in the *Ontario Energy Board Act*, 1998 to include the promotion of conservation of electricity and demand management, the facilitation of investments to implement a smart grid and the promotion of the use and generation of electricity from renewable energy sources.
