I am writing as a concerned resident of Ottawa regarding the proposed increase in residential electricity rates, which would see an additional \$6.08 per month for households consuming 750 kWh. While this may seem modest on paper, it is yet another burden added to the growing list of financial pressures facing families across Ontario.

We are currently grappling with a sharp rise in the cost of living. Housing costs have soared, groceries are increasingly unaffordable, and interest rates remain high, impacting mortgages, lines of credit, and student loans. Families, especially those in modest homes like my own, are already making difficult choices about where to cut back.
