

Great Lakes Power Limited ("GLPL") has filed an application with the Ontario Energy Board, dated October 20, 2008 under section 60 of the Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998, S.O. 1998, c.15 (Schedule B) for renewal of its electricity distribution licence. GLPL's current electricity distribution licence ED-1999-0227 is valid until December 31, 2008.

GLPL has also filed with the Board a letter dated November 17, 2008 requesting the Board to issue an interim order to extend the date of GLPL's current electricity distribution licence until such time as their application for a licence renewal is decided. An extension of its current licence will allow GLPL to **continue** operating its distribution system in the interim.

The Board has assigned the application file number EB-2008-0343. The application will be decided by the Counsel, Special Projects, who has been delegated this authority pursuant to section 6 of the Act. The Counsel, Special Projects, does not intend to provide for an award of costs when deciding this application.

The granting of the licence would enable the applicant to distribute electricity in Ontario. A normal term for an electricity distribution licence is 20 years. GLPL's application does not request a specific term for the licence.

## Joint task force tackles organized crime in native communities

MONTREAL — A joint squad of RCMP, Quebec provincial police and aboriginal police officers is fighting organized crime in native communities and helping boost the skills of aboriginal cops.

"We have contacts in all the communities," says Robert St-Jules, the RCMP staff sergeant in charge of operations for the Montreal-based Aboriginal Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit.

St-Jules said aboriginal communities are of interest to traditional organized crime groups because in some cases they allow easy crossing between Canada and the United States and touch other provinces.

"The intelligence clearly demonstrates that the different organizational (crime) elements within the province use the geographic location of the communities," he said.

Cpl. Francis McDougall, assistant chief of the 10-man Kikiga-Zibi police force in western Quebec, agreed.

"It seems like organized criminal activities are always trying to infiltrate the First Nations reserves," he said. "You not only see it here but other First Nations communities. I'd say it's a big problem all over the place."

The unit has recorded some big busts since its inception in 2005.

Forty-five people were arrested on drug charges in its first operation — code named Crystal — in 2005, which took down a Hells Angels-linked scheme to send drugs to the far north from Montreal by mail.

Operation Concert, which hit Kikiga-Zibi and the surrounding area a year later, saw the roundup of 26 people on 113 charges including drug production and trafficking to the United States.

Cleopatra in 2006 saw about 35 people arrested in Kanestake, Montreal and Sherbrooke while Opera-

tion Cancun, earlier this year, had 29 people from three native communities and Montreal in handcuffs on 90 charges. St-Jules pointed out that \$2.6 million was seized in that case along with a variety of drugs as well as 24 firearms, including a grenade launcher.

A case can be sparked either by the unit or from information received from an aboriginal police force, many of whom have had officers serving with the unit on a rotational basis.

"We gather all the intelligence and then we decide as a unit which (criminal) organization we're going to investigate strategically," St-Jules said. "The biggest thing that we look at is the impact that that investigation has to have. That's very important for us."

Drugs are a major problem in First Nations communities and have been a focus for the unit, which McDougall appreciates.

"The benefit is keeping the drugs out of the community, keeping our community safe, keeping the drugs away from our children," he said in a telephone interview. "There's so much out there now, new drugs coming up. It's unbelievable what these drugs can do to kids."

The unit operates only in Quebec and is commanded by a Quebec provincial police officer.

It was created after a standoff on the Kanestake Mohawk reserve in 2004 which was sparked when aboriginal police were brought in from outside to clean up local crime.

The officers had to barricade themselves in the police station while they were surrounded and the band chief's house was burned down.

There are seven aboriginal nations in 53 communities in Quebec, ranging from central reserves like Kahnawake near Montreal to tiny villages in the north.

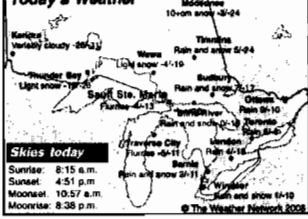

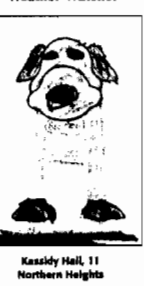

## Season brings out singer in all — even Superior

Is there a more spontaneous way to celebrate? Is there an easier way to express hope and love for the season? Do you even need a reason? Singing has to be one of the best parts of this holiday season. Now, a great tenor or alto or hummer or whistler I am not, but there is something about Christmas that brings out a greater desire to let the vocal chords loose. ## 'Equal say for equal pay'

Jocelyn pooh-poohs proposed planning board revamp; demands equal voice

JOCELYN TOWNSHIP — Council, with only three members present, unanimously turned down a recommendation that St. Joseph Island Planning Board representation be revamped.

Council contends each participating municipality ought to carry equal weight, which currently, isn't the case. The nine-member board consists of St. Joseph Township with five seats, Hilton Township with two and Hilton Village with one each.

The recommendation would have seen Jocelyn Township's presence increase by one seat. But council members all member townships ought to have equal representation in the form of one seat each.

A previously recorded vote of the seven board members, who were also present at council, saw six vote in favour and one was opposed.

Coun. Mavis Chisholm was absent from the meeting due to illness while Coun. Ron Wierzbicki — he suffered a stroke last April — has been granted a five-month leave, leaving Reeve Mark Henderson and councilors Ken Ward and Ches Wallace to vote.

Henderson said he agrees with paying an equal portion but opposes the recommendation, branding it undemocratic. "It goes against the whole democratic process," Henderson said. "We're the richest municipality, so we should have the most votes (referring to St. Joseph and its largest assessment base)."

Ward said he supports equal representation and doesn't understand why the board is not more fairly composed.

"It's not about them (St. Joseph Township). It's about us, together," Henderson said.

Individually, you have one vote, that's democracy. This is such a blatant move. People fought and died for democracy."

Ward added that it was possible the planning board thought Jocelyn Township would accept the recommendation.

In responding to the board's recommendation, council passed a resolution recommending equal representation and a balanced levy payment by each municipality.

"An equal say for equal pay," Henderson said.

Ward agreed. "All we are asking for are equal rights," he said.

Wallace said in a later telephone interview that he voted with the board in favour of the recommendation that would have given Jocelyn one more seat. But, at council, he agreed the four municipalities should have equal representation.

"It would be fair to everybody," Wallace said.

One more for Hilton Village would be even better. That would be a big improvement, I think."

Jocelyn's resolution also recommended the board review its application fees in a bid to reduce costs.

Henderson questioned the present

operation cost, contending it is too high, between honorariums and administration fees.

"It should only cost a few hundred dollars in paperwork per meeting," Henderson added.

The present operating budget is \$23,700 per year.

Of that, 42 per cent is administration costs and 8.5 per cent is paid out in honorariums.

The remaining budget costs include general board expenses, such as audit fees and travel expenses, as well as postage, training and insurance costs, excluding the price of the St. Joseph Island Official Plan, which has not been paid for.

The planning board completed a review of the issue, regarding the present composition of the board and recommended the board size be increased to 10 members, with representation being based on assessment.

"This change, if endorsed by the four municipal councils on the island and approved by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, would result in one additional member for the Township of Jocelyn and would also eliminate the potential of perceived inequity of one municipality being able to control the board," wrote board secretary Mike Jagger to St. Joseph Island's four municipalities.

The planning board cost will continue to be based on equalized assessment.

Jagger said that the board carried out an analysis of the effect of using assessment, population and number of households, as the basis of board composition.

"The board also looked at what is being done elsewhere and feels that representation based on assessment is the fairest and most workable alternative," Jagger wrote.

## Child dead, another seriously injured in Peterborough fire

PETERBOROUGH, Ont. — One child is dead and another is being treated for serious injuries in a Toronto hospital after five townhouse units in eastern Ontario were destroyed by fire early this morning. Peterborough firefighters were called to the blaze around 1 a.m. in the north end of the city.

The Ontario Fire Marshal is on the scene and hasn't determined a cause. However, acting fire chief Trent Gervais says a generator and fuel canisters below one of the townhouse units are being investigated.

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
